

Many authors of general poultry text-books obviously feel a powerful incentive to discuss fundamental principles and controversial theories on such matters as breeding and nutrition. However fascinating these subjects may be for the specialist poultryman with a leaning to scientific theory they are of no immediate importance to the poultryman faced with the task of getting through his daily chores. He wants to know that if he does a thing some other development will ensue. In the daily round he is not concerned with the reasons why that particular happening is a consequence of his actions; he is aware that there are books dealing in detail with the nature of these specialised matters if he wishes to follow them up.

The author maintains the same attitude towards poultry practice throughout. As a result the chapters dealing with building construction, recording and accounts are relatively more extensive than is customary in poultry books. This continued emphasis on practice allied with a readable style make this book eminently suitable for those whose success must depend on their abilities as practising poultrymen and women.

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
