



Dr. Udal Pareek is Chairman of the Academy of Human Resource Development. Ahmedabad (promoted by the National HRD Network). Distinguished Visiting Professor at the Indian Institute of Health Management Research, Jaipur, and Adjunct Professor of Health Policy and Administration in the University of North Carolina, USA. He is Chairman of the Governing Board of the Institute of Developmental Research and Statistics, Jaipur and Vice President of the Management Board of IIHMR. He is a member of the Rajasthan State Planning Board. He has been Chairman of the Governing Boards of the Institute of Development Studies, the South Asian Association of Psychologists; the National HRD Network, and the Indian Society of Applied Behavioural Science, and Chairman of the Scientific Advisory Committee of IIHMR. He was the only Asian to become Fellow of the National Training Laboratories, USA, and the only Fellow from India of the Society for the Study of Social Issues. He is Fellow of the Indian Society of Extension Education. He has been US-AID HRD/OD Advisor to the Ministry of Health, Government of Indonesia; L&T Professor of Organisational Behaviour, IIM. Ahmedabad; Director, School of Basic Sciences and Humanities, University of Udaipur; Director in SIET Institute, Hyderabad and Professor at the Indian Agricultural Research Institute, New Delhi and the National Institute of Health Administration and Education, New Delhi. Dr. Pareek is or has been the editor for numerous reputed journals. He has authored or edited about 50 books and more than 350 papers. He has been given several national awards and has been cited in a large number of national and international biographical reference books.

Dr.T.V. Rao is currently Chairman, of T.V. Rao Learning Systems Pvt. Ltd. He worked as a Professor at the Indian Institute of Management, Ahmedabad for over 20 years beginning 1973. He held various positions at IIMA including that of Chairman of the Fellow Program, Post Graduate Program, Public Systems Group, Ravi Matthai Center, OB Area etc. He has also worked as L&T Professor of HRD at XLRI. Jamshedpur during 1983-88. Dr. Rao is the Founder and First President of the National HRD Network and was Chairman, Academic Council and Founder Director of the Academy of Human Resources Development, Ahmedabad, He was also President of the Indian Society for Applied Behavioral Science. Dr. Rao has over 30 books and publications to his credit in the areas of HRD, Performance management, education, entrepreneurship, health, population and management training. Dr. Rao worked as HRD Adviser to reserve bank of India, and as a short-term consultant to UNESCO, Ministry of Health, Indonesia, National Entrepreneurial Development Association, Malaysia and the Commonwealth Secretariat, London, Dr. Rao has designed and assisted in implementing performance appraisal and other HRD Systems for a number of organizations in India and Abroad.

Pareek and Rao together have designed the first HRD Department in 1975 before such dedicated departments existed anywhere else in the world. They have outlined the principles behind the designing of HR systems nearly thirty years ago and were responsible for designing and implementing HR systems in a number of Originations in India.
